

TEN VESSELS SUNK, ANOTHER ATTACKED

*Danish Ship Is Set on Fire—
Greek Steamer Destroyed by
U-Boat in Mediterranean.*

LONDON, June 26.—The sinking of ten vessels was reported today. All were sailing craft except the British steamers *Astrologer*, 918 tons gross, owned in Leith, and the *Canford Chine*, owned in Cardiff. Eight members of the *Astrologer's* crew were landed and the remainder are missing.

The sailing vessels sunk were the *Giuseppina*, *Santissima*, *Sagrado*, and *Saniglia*, Italian; the *Chinchella*, French, and one of unknown nationality.

A report to Lloyd's shipping agency says the Danish schooner *Svateen* has been attacked and set on fire.

The *Canford Chine* was sunk by a submarine off Calella, Spain, last night, according to a dispatch from Barcelona. The Captain and twelve of the crew were landed at Barcelona. The vessel was of 2,839 tons gross and 304 feet long, and was built in Newcastle in 1903.

The Greek steamer *Nitsa*, which sailed from Norfolk on June 5 for Savona, Italy, has foundered in the Mediterranean. Her crew was saved. A Lloyd's dispatch from Alicante, Spain, says that the vessel was torpedoed and sank off Cape Palos.

Lloyd's announces that the Italian bark *San Francisco*, plying between Buenos Aires and Genoa, was sunk by a submarine Saturday when twenty miles off Barcelona, Spain. The crew was saved. The *San Francisco* was a vessel of 960 tons.

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
